How LSTA Funding from IMLS Benefits Colorado Libraries



LSTA IS THE PRIMARY SOURCE OF FUNDING FOR MORE THAN 30 LIBRARY SERVICES/PROGRAMS IN COLORADO

Colorado received \$3.0 million in Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) during FY2022-2023. This is roughly 62% of the State Library's operational budget with State funds comprising the remaining 38%.

LSTA funding supports most State Library services for Colorado libraries including: the Colorado Talking Book Library; the Library Research Service; early learning; professional development for school library staff; library leadership and trustee support; institutional libraries; digital collection and technology solutions; resource kits; and state publications.

Besides funding these ongoing projects that enhance library services statewide, LSTA has been used to support the creation of many familiar regional programs such as Colorado Historic Newspapers Collection, Plains to Peaks Collective, SWIFT Interlibrary Loan, Check Out Colorado State Parks, and Growing Readers Together.

WHAT IS IMLS AND LSTA*?

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) distributes Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding through the Grants to States program. It is the largest source of federal funding for America's public libraries.

Using a population-based formula, more than \$168 million was distributed to 59 State Library Administrative Agencies (SLAAs) located in: Each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia; The Territories; and The Freely Associated States.

To strengthen the impact of the federal investment in the Grants to States program, IMLS and SLAAs have partnered to shift the way in which Grants to States program information is gathered and shared, improve program evaluation and reporting, and highlight evidence-based best practices. Results of this work are incorporated in the publicly accessible annual reporting tool known as the <u>State Program Report</u> (SPR).

One of the program's statutory priorities is to address underserved communities and persons having difficulty using a library. In Colorado 32% of grant funds supported library services for those unable to read standard print as well as those residing in state run institutions.

- Family literacy programs in state institutions to support parent-child relationships

- Establish up-to-date institutional library standards and best practices, evaluate library services, and provide relevant, easily accessible reports and information to institutions staff and leaders
