

NAEP Item Maps

What is it?

The **NAEP Item Maps** use released questions from previous NAEP assessments to illustrate the knowledge and skills demonstrated by students performing at different performance levels for civics, economics, mathematics, reading, science, and U.S. history.

NAEP Item Maps help answer the question, “What does it mean for students to be at *Basic*, *Proficient*, or *Advanced*, in terms of what they know and can do?” Item Maps help depict this by plotting descriptions of individual assessment items along the NAEP scale. Where the item is plotted on the scale indicates a dividing line: students with scores above that position are likely to answer the question correctly, while those with scores below are less likely to.

How do I access it?

The item map below contains selected item descriptions mapped to the 2007 NAEP mathematics scale. The map helps to illustrate the knowledge and skills demonstrated by students performing at different scale scores on the 2007 assessment. Items that have been released to the public are underlined and linked to the [NAEP Questions Tool](#) where the item, scoring guide, key, student responses, and performance data can be viewed. (Items that have not been hyperlinked have not been released and are still in use.) The item map also includes

- A symbol next to each item descriptor that indicates the item's content classification (see legend at bottom of item map).
- Item type (multiple choice [MC] or constructed response [CR]).
- A notation after each constructed-response item descriptor that identifies the score level of the item (e.g., "Correct," "Partially Correct," "Incorrect").
- Links to achievement-level descriptions (*Advanced*, *Proficient*, and *Basic*).

How do I use it?

Simply go to the website, and in the search box on the right, select the subject, year, and grade you'd like to view. Click **Submit**, and the Item Map you requested will be displayed on the screen.

The Item Map also provides links to released questions. Clicking on a link will take you directly to the question in the NAEP Questions Tool, where you can also view related information such as sample student responses and performance data. For example, in reading, you can view the questions as well as the passage students must read to answer each question.

Comparing Student Groups

The NAEP Item Maps have a special feature called **Compare Student Groups**. Using this feature, you can view performance information by different student groups, such as gender or race/ethnicity. You can also view individual, state-level results in mathematics, reading, science, and writing. You can review the results of any one of 11 urban districts participating in the NAEP Trial Urban District Assessment (TUDA) for those same subjects. State and TUDA results are only available for grades 4 and 8.

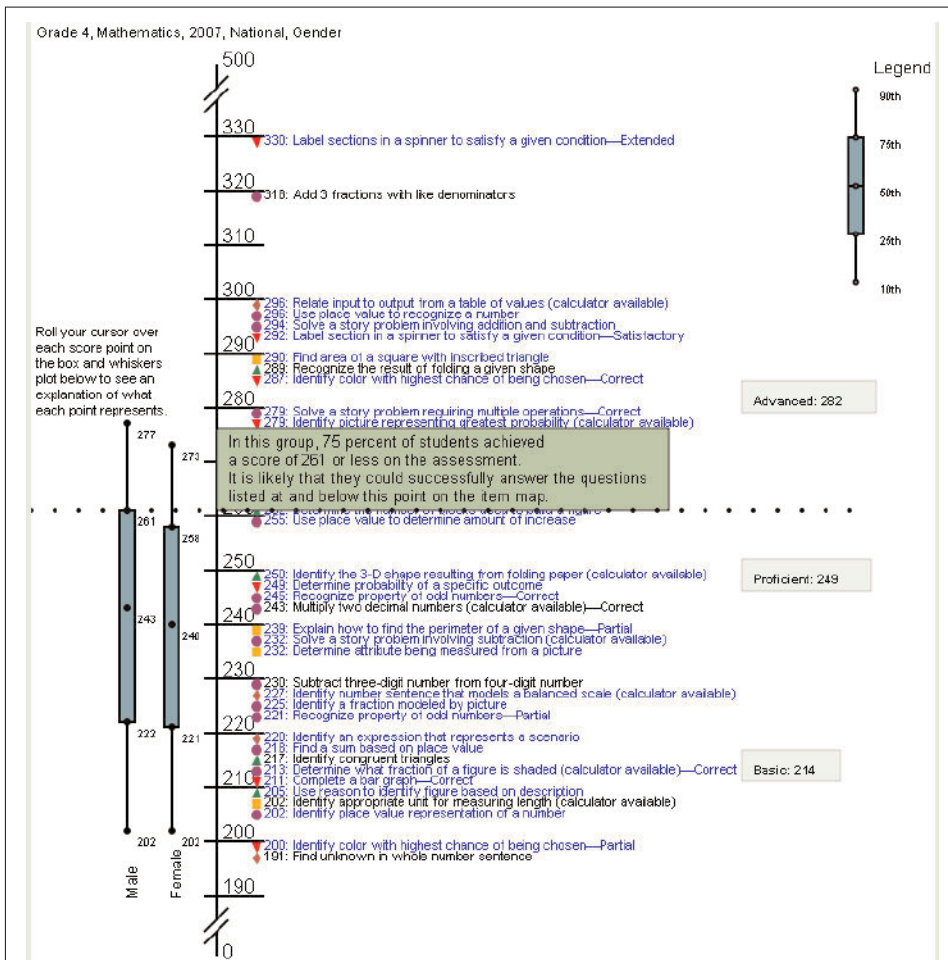
Percentiles for mathematics, grade 4, Gender [GENDER]: By jurisdiction, 2007

The graphical version shows the questions that reflect the knowledge and skills likely to be demonstrated by most students performing in the 25th to 75th percentile range when you mouse over the “box” area of the accompanying boxplot chart.
