1	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Good morning. The State
2	Board of Education will please come back to order. And Ms.
3	Burdsall, why don't you call the roll call for it, please?
4	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Flores.
5	MS. FLORES: Here.
6	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Goff. Goff?
7	MS. GOFF: Here.
8	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Mazanec.
9	MS. MAZANEC: Here.
10	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Rankin.
11	MS. RANKIN: Here.
12	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Scheffel.
13	MS. SCHEFFEL: Here.
14	MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Schroeder.
15	MS SCHROEDER: Here.
16	MS. BURDSALL: Chairman Durham.
17	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Here. Quorum is present.
18	Now, first item is our Lieutenant Governor's update. Mr.
19	Garcia, Lieutenant Governor Garcia.
20	MR. GARCIA: Thank you, Mr. Chair. It's a
21	pleasure to be here. Hello, Commissioner. Okay. I hope
22	everybody can hear me. I just have a very brief update. I
23	just want to, of course, as I always do, try to let you know
24	what's going on at the Department of Higher Ed, what's going



- 1 on within the administration that relates to the important
- 2 work that you do.
- I want to mention, you've all heard about the
- 4 Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative. It's now
- 5 approved 24 local scholarship programs. And the idea is to
- 6 take a limited amount of state money and to leverage it with
- 7 local communities by saying we will match money you raise to
- 8 help you provide scholarships to students from your -- from
- 9 your city, from your county. And what we've seen is we're -
- 10 or we've already released over \$4.3 million, and the goal
- 11 is to take \$7 million of state money and convert that
- 12 through this leveraging into \$14 million of additional
- 13 support for students who are going on to college.
- We also, within COSI, the Colorado
- 15 Opportunity Scholarship Initiative, had created a catalog,
- 16 essentially an online catalog of all the student support
- 17 programs around the state that are intended to help students
- 18 complete high school and make the transition successfully
- 19 into college. We've identified over 300 such programs, but
- 20 many of them are largely invisible to the students and
- 21 families who most need them and would take advantage of
- 22 them. So we've put those all online and continue to catalog
- 23 every new program we can find because the worst thing, of
- 24 course, is for people to start programs and have resources
- 25 that students aren't able to take advantage of.



- 1 We also continue to -- continue to work with
- 2 our college and university partners to strengthen our prior
- 3 learning assessment programs. We know a lot of students
- 4 come to college with knowledge and skills that should be
- 5 converted in and accepted as college credit so that they can
- 6 more quickly complete a degree, and whether they have --
- 7 whether that comes through concurrent enrollment or military
- 8 service or a whole range of other things, these are things
- 9 that students have already worked hard to learn, and they
- 10 should be able to get credit for it. We need to figure out
- 11 how to make sure that we have a consistent way of doing that
- 12 around the state.
- I also wanna introduce somebody very
- 14 important. It's a new hire at the Colorado Department of
- 15 Higher Ed. I'm gonna ask him to stand back here, Dr.
- 16 Timothy Flanagan. And Dr. Flanagan has joined our staff as
- 17 the Chief Student Success and Academic Affairs Officer. So
- 18 that's the most important kind of high level director
- 19 position within the department that works with students in
- 20 improving the opportunity for students to move into higher
- 21 education.
- 22 He has a strong background working in a lot
- 23 of colleges and universities that really focused on, at
- 24 least historically, on teacher preparation programs. They
- 25 were -- all of the colleges he's worked at, all the



- 1 universities, were what -- originally called normal schools,
- 2 the schools where we send young men and women to learn how
- 3 to become educators. He also has been a university provost,
- 4 the university president -- president most recently in
- 5 Illinois, but he's also worked in Texas, in Massachusetts.
- 6 And around the country. We think he's gonna bring a great
- 7 deal of very important experience to -- to the -- to the
- 8 department, and he's going to be able to work well with all
- 9 of our college and university presidents.
- 10 He had actually retired a couple of years ago
- 11 and moved to Colorado and found that retirement just didn't
- 12 agree with him because he had too much to offer. And we were
- 13 very fortunate when we were trying to hire for this position
- 14 that we were able to find someone with that level of
- 15 experience. So just really happy to -- to -- to introduce
- 16 him to you.
- I also want to mention Dr. Robert Mitchell.
- 18 Of course, he's been working with department of -- this
- 19 department and all folks around teacher preparation
- 20 programs. We -- he will be continuing to work with the
- 21 department and working with Dr. Flanagan, again, to improve
- 22 the quality of our teacher prep programs.
- 23 And that's the issue you guys recognize as
- 24 very important. And Commissioner Randall, I wanna commend
- 25 for his recent efforts to go out to Arizona State University



- 1 and to talk to students who are still enrolled in programs
- 2 about the idea of teaching in Colorado. We know that we
- 3 have a couple of challenges here, significant challenges,
- 4 and one is ensuring that we have high-quality teachers, but
- 5 also ensuring that we have an adequate quantity of teachers
- 6 entering the profession, especially in our rural areas. So
- 7 I really wanna commend the Commissioner and all of you for
- 8 staying focused on that.
- 9 I was in a rural community yesterday, I was
- 10 in Limon as part of our One Book for Colorado tour and was
- 11 able to visit an outstanding Early Childhood Education
- 12 Center but also to talk with other educators about the
- 13 challenge of attracting and retaining high-quality
- 14 educators. And that's one of the most important things we
- 15 can do. And I just again, want to thank you for continuing
- 16 to focus on that. It's not an issue that's gonna be easily
- 17 resolved. We just have a growing demand, and it's becoming
- 18 more and more of a challenge to get high-performing students
- 19 to choose teaching as a profession. It's long hours. The
- 20 pay isn't terribly great. It's incredibly high pressure, and
- 21 we continue to put pressure on our teachers, and some of
- 22 that, of course, is warranted. We want our teachers to be
- 23 high performing because we want our students to be able to
- 24 perform at a high level when they graduate.



- 1 So yesterday or rather on Monday, I was in
- 2 Washington, D.C. with Lumina Foundation at the National
- 3 Press Club, where they were issuing the 2016 report called A
- 4 Stronger Nation that is really focused on understanding the
- 5 challenges we face as a nation if we don't educate enough of
- 6 our young people. Lumina has set a broad national goal to
- 7 hit 60 percent post-secondary attainment by 2025. As a
- 8 nation, we're far from that. In Colorado, we've set even a
- 9 higher goal because frankly, we are already ahead of our
- 10 peer states. So we set a goal of 66 percent. That doesn't
- 11 mean 66 percent of our population with a bachelor's degree
- 12 necessarily, but a bachelors and associates degree, or a
- 13 post-secondary certificate that will help students get a
- 14 living wage job. That is really critically important
- 15 especially as we look to the future of Colorado where we
- 16 know that three-fourths of all new jobs by 2020 will require
- 17 post-secondary credential.
- 18 So I wanna just leave you with that
- 19 challenge. This is the last time I will be presenting to
- 20 you. It's been an honor to work with not just this
- 21 Commissioner but his predecessor, many of your predecessors.
- 22 I know that what you do here is about the most important job
- 23 in the state. This is a body that isn't -- is not well-
- 24 known by the public, and yet what you do, no one could
- 25 argue, is the most important thing we do as a state, and



- 1 that is try to ensure that all of our young people
- 2 throughout the state have access to a high-quality
- 3 education.
- 4 And I would encourage you to do what I've
- 5 seen you do, which is to listen not just to the loudest
- 6 voices but the most important voices, and that's the voices
- 7 of those children and families for whom getting a quality
- 8 education is their only hope. Nothing could be more
- 9 important to them. So keep that in mind as you continue to
- 10 do your work every day. It's so critically important, and
- 11 it's what's gonna set Colorado apart. If we continue to
- 12 provide for every student, in every school, in every
- 13 community, the opportunity to get a high-quality education
- 14 so they can, if they choose, move on successfully to post-
- 15 secondary education. Thank you very much. Thank you, Mr.
- 16 Chair.
- 17 (Applause)
- 18 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Don't run off.
- MR. GARCIA: Okay.
- 20 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Are there any questions or
- 21 comments for the Lieutenant Governor? Yes, we did -- we
- 22 understand that as a parting gift, you wanted a prepaid trip
- 23 to Sturgis. We -- we don't have that. But Dr. Schroeder
- 24 has something she'd like to read, and I would just like to
- 25 say before we start that I appreciate the attention that



- 1 you've given, the support, and -- and the issues that face
- 2 us, just on a personal note, so --
- 3 MR. GARCIA: Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: -- Dr. Schroeder.
- 5 MS. SCHROEDER: Well, and I would add that I
- 6 hope this is not the last time that you come to us, just
- 7 only in your present position. But I'd like to read -- read
- 8 a resolution recognizing the contribution Lieutenant
- 9 Governor Joe Garcia has made to the education in Colorado.
- 10 In honor of Lieutenant Governor Joseph
- 11 Garcia, on the occasion of his final update to the Colorado
- 12 Board of Education, on April 14, 2016, whereas, Lieutenant
- 13 Governor Joseph Garcia has been an invaluable partner with
- 14 the Colorado State Board of Education and the Colorado
- 15 Department of Education in our efforts to prepare all
- 16 students for college or careers since he was sworn into
- 17 office of Lieutenant Governor in 2011.
- 18 And whereas, Joe is uniquely experienced and
- 19 knowledgeable about the role Higher Education plays in
- 20 Colorado as Executive Director of the Colorado Commission on
- 21 Higher Education, as well as being past president of
- 22 Colorado State University Pueblo and serving as a past
- 23 president of the second largest community college in
- 24 Colorado, Pikes Peak Community College.



- 1 And whereas, Joe has fought tirelessly for
- 2 the education of all children in Colorado, understanding the
- 3 importance of building a cohesive education system from
- 4 preschool through college and advocating for strong literacy
- 5 programs. And whereas, when he was not riding his
- 6 motorcycle, Joe has given selflessly to the education of
- 7 Colorado students and the future of children.
- 8 And whereas, Joe has pushed for fighting
- 9 regional solutions to higher education, battling for
- 10 expanding access to higher education for all students in
- 11 Colorado, especially students of color and first-generation
- 12 college students because he knows that a highly educated
- 13 workforce is critical to the future of our entire state.
- 14 Whereas, Joe has been a tireless advocate for
- 15 the Colorado Native American and Latino students and a
- 16 relentless supporter of raising expectations for all
- 17 students and ensuring that all students have access to a
- 18 world-class education.
- 19 Whereas, we congratulate Joe on his
- 20 acceptance of a position as President of Western Interstate
- 21 Commission for Higher Education, where he will continue to
- 22 work collaboratively to expand education access and
- 23 excellence for all citizens of the West.
- Now therefore be it resolved, the Colorado
- 25 State Board of Education formally commends Lieutenant



- 1 Governor Joseph Garcia for his outstanding service as our
- 2 Lieutenant Governor, his commitment to continually improving
- 3 education for the children of Colorado, and his enduring
- 4 dedication to making sure all children receive a world-class
- 5 education and are prepared to enter college or the
- 6 workforce.
- 7 (Applause)
- 8 MR. GARCIA: Thank you. Thank you.
- 9 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: We do have a copy of the
- 10 resolution. I don't know if we one of those fancy expensive
- 11 folders. But if -- if we don't, we have to retrieve it
- 12 first. So we'll just take a short recess.
