



Multigenerational program/activity – People from multiple generations attend or engage, often as family groups.

Intergenerational program/activity — People from multiple generations intentionally interact and connect, often outside their family groups.




Be intentional – what outcomes and impacts do you want your program to have? Would a multi- or inter- generational program help you achieve your program goals and support your community?

Why bring generations together?

Colorado (and the rest of the US) are aging! – by 2050 there will be more 65+ adults than children and youth under 15.

Women born in the 1990s can expect to live to 100+ years of age!

Loneliness and generational isolation are public health challenges.



reduce agism at both ends of the age continuum.

improve *everyone's* mental health, social skills, & cognitive abilities (including program staff!).

may be more inclusive of cultures where mixed generational activities are the norm.

build community.






Opportunities to practice "collective care"

Planning factors to think about:

- ☐ What are the generational demographics in your community? What cultural or logistical factors affect how different generations interact in community spaces?
- ☐ Where do different generations gather in your library? How does the space help or hinder generations from interacting with each other?
- ☐ What do you want to achieve with intergenerational programs/activities/spaces?
- ☐ Create all new programs/activities or "intergenerationalize" existing ones?
- ☐ Could you connect with your adult/elder services staff to co-design this?



- What community organizations work with which generations? Do they already connect with each other? Could you connect them?
- ☐ What activities might lend themselves to intentional interaction between generations?
- ☐ What shared behavior & communications norms will you need to establish so everyone is comfortable?
- ☐ Where can you get the word out across generations?


