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EXPELLED AND AT-RISK STUDENT SERVICES (EARSS) GRANT PROGRAM

History

The “Services to Expelled Students” grant program was enacted by the Colorado state legislature in 1997. The statute was amended in 2000 to include students at-risk of expulsion and renamed the “Expelled and At-Risk Student Services” program. With additional amendments in 2008, funds can also support services to students at-risk of being declared habitually truant.

Eligible Applicants and Students to be Served

Funds are annually appropriated to the Colorado Department of Education for the purpose of making grants to school districts, alternative schools within school districts, charter schools, BOCES, non-profit, non-parochial schools, and facility schools. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis for a 4-year award period.

For the purposes of the program descriptions contained in this document, the term “at risk” indicates only the students eligible to be served by the grant, those being expelled students, student at risk of expulsion, and truant students defined by unexcused absences.

Purpose

The primary purpose of the grant is to prevent future expulsions and habitual truancy. Because non-attendance and disciplinary actions in response to misconduct are risk factors for dropping out of school, the EARSS program contributes to dropout prevention efforts by concentrating on early intervention strategies, student engagement strategies and supportive services to reduce these risk factors.

Accountability and Sustainability

Grantees are required to set performance measures and report progress on their measures in the following four areas: parent/family engagement, academics, attendance, school discipline/safety or social-emotional wellness.

To support sustainability efforts, the grant is structured with a scale-down of funds in the third and fourth year of the grant. Funds are reduced by 25 percent and 50 percent in years three and four, respectively, from whichever is the highest funded amount in years 1 or 2.

Appropriation and Number of Grants Awarded

The 2018 General Assembly increased the annual state appropriation by \$2 million. For the 2018-19 school year the appropriation is \$9,493,560. The additional funds allowed for a second release of funds for a new grant opportunity titled the EARSS Intervention Grant (EIG).

For the 2018-19 school year, 27 new grants were awarded and 33 continuation awards were made to grantees moving into years 2-4 for a total of 60 grantees.
