Expelled and At-Risk Student Services (EARSS) Grant Program

History

The "Services to Expelled Students" grant program was enacted by the Colorado state legislature in 1997. The statute was amended in 2000 to include students at-risk of expulsion and renamed the "Expelled and At-Risk Student Services" program. With additional amendments in 2021, funds can also support services to students at-risk of being chronically absent.

Eligible Applicants and Students to be Served

Funds are annually appropriated to the Colorado Department of Education for the purpose of making grants to school districts, alternative schools within school districts, charter schools, BOCES, non-profit, non-parochial schools, and facility schools. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis for a 4-year award period.

For the purposes of the program descriptions contained in this document, the term "at risk" indicates only the students eligible to be served by the grant. These students include only expelled students, students at risk of expulsion, and truant students defined by unexcused absences. Program descriptions may describe a broader context so not all strategies referenced may necessarily be fundable.

Purpose

The primary purpose of the grant is to prevent future expulsions and habitual truancy. Because non-attendance and disciplinary actions in response to misconduct are risk factors for dropping out of school, the EARSS program contributes to dropout prevention efforts by concentrating on early intervention strategies, student engagement strategies and supportive services to reduce these risk factors. At a minimum, grantees must provide educational services, meaning instruction for academic content areas.

Accountability

Grantees are required to set performance measures and report progress on their measures in the following three areas: academics, attendance, school discipline/safety or social-emotional wellness. Grantees currently in Year 3 and 4 also have a parent/family engagement measure.

Starting in 2022-2023 school year, Cohort 2 grantees were provided a 6-month 1ning period. This provided time for the grantee to hold stakeholder meetings, hire new staff, offer training, and identify students who will receive services starting 2023-2024 school year. Grantees whose funds expire at the end of this school year were eligible for 1ning period funding.

Appropriation and Number of Grants Awarded

For the 2021-2022 school year the appropriation is \$9,493,560 and 52 grants are funded to district, charter school, and facility schools in Colorado. This includes 13 EARSS grantees in the 1ning period of the grant.
