## Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Colorado was 292. This was higher than the average score of 283 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Colorado in 2011 (292) was higher than their average score in 2009 (287) and in 1990 (267).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Colorado at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 49 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1990 (44 points).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 43 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (17 percent).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 80 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (76 percent) and in 1990 (57 percent).

## Score Gaps for Student Groups

■ In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1990 (36 points).

- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 31 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1990 (27 points).
- In 2011, male students in Colorado had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
■ In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 30 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was wider than that in 1996 (23 points).
