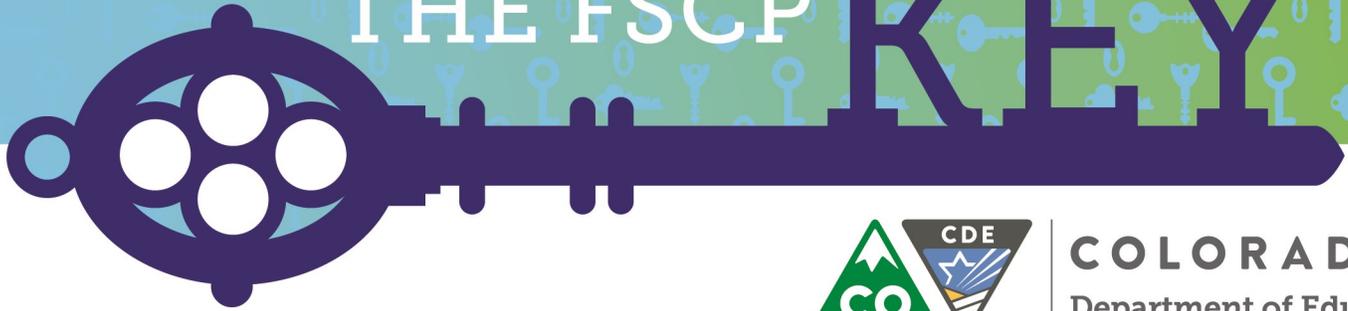

PROMISING PRACTICES

The Summit School District, in connection with their local Family Intercultural Resource Center (FIRC), has created an outreach and home-visitation program called “Conexiones.”

Conexiones is a kindergarten readiness program which aims to increase school connectedness, high school graduation rates, representation in advanced placement classes, enrollment in postsecondary institutions, and close the achievement gap. In the short term, Conexiones aims to increase the proficiency level of students in their academic achievement, increase the number of positive behavior referrals, increase administrative and teacher contact with families, and increase attendance rates.

Summit School District has identified family engagement as a key to the success of learners within the district at every age. As a result, the district actively connects with all parents, families, and community partners to build a network of support for every student’s academic success, character development, and social-emotional health.

RESEARCH BRIEF

The U.S. Department of Education established the Dual Capacity-Building Framework (2014) to guide state offices, school districts, and schools in establishing FSCP programs focused on student learning. The research-based framework recognizes that in order for FSCP to be effective, educational systems need to work in coordination with one another to build the capacity of educators and families.

Some initial steps to creating and sustaining a comprehensive FSCP program include:

- **Creating a team** to focus on engaging family and community partners to help improve student success.
- **Writing annual family engagement plans** that are embedded in the school improvement plan.
- **Reflecting** upon your family and community engagement events and program at least annually to understand what was implemented well and where improvement are needed.
- **Providing professional development** opportunities related to family and community engagement practices.

SACPIE SPOTLIGHT

Colorado is extremely fortunate to have the State Advisory Council for Parent Involvement in Education (SACPIE) as a support to collect and share promising partnership practices.

Established during the 2009 legislative session, SACPIE’s overarching goal is to partner with Colorado’s families in maximizing the potential of every student by:

- Reducing dropout rates.

- Reducing gaps in academic achievement and growth among student groups.
- Increasing the number of students who continue into higher education.
