

Colorado Backcountry Winter Safety Awareness Week (Dec 7 - 13) key messages:

- Outdoor agencies across Colorado have reported an increase in visitation and off-grid winter recreation.
- Skiing and winter sports are a vital driver to Colorado's economy. During the pandemic, some ski areas may have limited capacity and reservation protocols which could result in more people recreating in Colorado's backcountry.
- Backcountry recreation can be dangerous and requires certain safety precautions and equipment to ensure a safe outdoor experience.
- In an effort to reduce any increased impact on Colorado's natural resources and search and rescue teams- Colorado Parks and Wildlife, Colorado Tourism Office, Office of Outdoor Recreation Industry, Colorado Avalanche Information Center and Colorado Search and Rescue Association developed a [backcountry safety pledge](#) and [educational online resource](#) to promote the diverse winter outdoor opportunities that exist in our state and how to recreate responsibly.
- The goal of the campaign is to inspire Coloradans and visitors to take the Backcountry Winter Safety Pledge and balance safe outdoor recreation with mindful conservation.
- First-time visitors to the backcountry are encouraged to complete safety training and hire a certified guide if they do not possess the skills to safely explore the backcountry.
- Governor Jared Polis proclaimed Dec. 7-13 "Colorado Backcountry Winter Safety Awareness Week". Throughout the week, we ask outdoor recreation agencies and stakeholders to promote important backcountry winter safety messages.
