

Advanced – Performance Level 4 (Score range: 651 to 910)

Students produce writing that is engaging and organized with supporting details and that contains vivid and precise vocabulary. Students demonstrate an exceptional knowledge of standard English usage, such as pronoun-antecedent agreement, capitalization, and punctuation.

Proficient – Performance Level 3 (Score range: 556 to 651)

Students produce writing that is engaging, focused, organized, and contains some precise vocabulary. A variety of sentence structures is evident. The text is mostly fluent. Students display knowledge of standard English usage, such as subject-verb agreement and spelling.

Partially Proficient – Performance level 2 (Score range: 434 to 555)

Students produce writing that is mostly readable; they use familiar vocabulary and some varying of sentence structure. Students demonstrate a limited knowledge of standard English usage, such as subject-verb agreement, conventional spelling, capitalization, and punctuation.

Unsatisfactory – Performance level 1 (Score range: 250 to 433)

Students produce writing that lacks focus and demonstrates limited word choice, little understanding of sentence structure, capitalization and punctuation, or standard English usage.
